

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

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MEET INDIE AUTHOR DJ EDWARDSON

The Speculative Author Blazing a Trail on his Own

Inspired by the film *Dead Poet's Society*,
DJ Edwardson took the phrase "carpe
diem" to heart and set out to explore the
vast reaches of his imagination and share
the stories he discovers with readers all
over the world. He brings The Chronotrace
Sequence (Giraffix Media) to life with a
captivating look at a future none of us
would want, and the very human struggle
to stop it from happening.

Brock: DJ, how did The Chronotrace Sequence concept come about?

DJ: The Chronotrace Sequence started out with the premise of what the world would look like without Christianity. Originally I had the main character stumbling upon an actual believer and rediscovering what faith was, but as the plot developed over the years, the story became more about a society where technology has taken over everything and God's role in the events became more covert and less obvious.

Brock: Who are the protagonists and why are they unique?

DJ: The main character is Adan. What makes him unique is that he has completely lost his memory. Not just his identity, but he doesn't even know basic things like how to eat or walk. So even though he is an adult, in the early parts of the story he functions very much like a child. Add to that the fact that the technology in this series is extremely advanced and Adan has a hard time getting his bearings. One of the main story arcs is his journey to find his identity, which adds an element of mystery to the story, I think.

Gavin is the other main character and he functions as a mentor to Adan, helping him orient himself and even training Adan to use certain skills he has. He provides a window into the organization of scientists who control everything and shows that God can reach even into that kind of world and pull someone out of it.

Brock: In three sentences, what is the third book, *The Ascent of the Nebula*, about?

DJ: The futility of trusting in our own power over God. The book also explores what it means to be human. And it wrestles with the mysterious nature of God.


Brock: You use a lot of invented words in The Chronotrace Sequence. Where do you come up with all this exotic terminology?

DJ: Well, for instance, there is a certain people group that speaks another language and so when I mention words from that language I just used Spanish, which is the only other language I am fluent in besides English. And then for the technology I used a mixture of Latin, French and English roots and just combined them in different ways, like for "oscillathe" which is this weapon that disintegrates people, I combined the words "oscillate" and "lathe"—pretty simple. That's actually one of the things I love about writing in general, and writing sci-fi and fantasy in particular-getting to make up new

words. When you're describing things that don't exist in our world, making up new words is a necessity, really.

Brock: How do you believe this story relates to the lives of readers?

DJ: Hardly a day goes by when I don't hear something on the news and think, "Yep, we're one step closer to the kind of world I wrote about in the Chronotrace." Cloning, virtual reality, the increasing role of technology in our lives, that's all happening right now and most people seem blissfully unaware of where it's all headed. Science has become the standard for truth that trumps everything else. All you have to do is say "well, science says..." and the argument is over in most people's minds. As if science is this monolith and has totally figured out the meaning of life, humanity and everything in between. It really functions very much like the magisterium of the

church in the Middle Ages. They have all the answers, we are all just ignorant and have to accept what they say "because science." We can't think for ourselves, we can't dissent. We just need to get in line and bow the knee to the technological idol. That's the world of my story, and hopefully people who read it will see that it's not a very attractive one.

Brock: What is the biblical background or basis for the series?

DI: I really think of this series as futuristic "pre-incarnate" Christianity. Okay, that was a mouthful. What I mean is that it has a more Old Testament level of revelation and yet it's set in the far future. So some of my inspiration for the events of the novel comes from Exodus, Old Testament prophets, and, though not strictly biblical, the story of the pilgrims. It's an odd mix, but those are some of the places I drew my inspiration from. It also wrestles with the idea of what to do when God's will is not all that clear. Even for those of us who have the Bible, there are mysterious aspects to God's will that we cannot fully understand. The characters in this series have to learn to have faith in a God they cannot see or hear, just as we all do. FFE

SUSPENSE

MIKE NAPPA

Bestselling author Mike Nappa is releasing a new book that should be at the top of your list for suspenseful reads, *Annabel Lee* (Revell). Annabel Lee Truckson lives life underground, kept there by her strange uncle in a military-style bunker. With only a guard dog and some brief instructions, she is told she shouldn't open the door for anyone—*not even her uncle*. Above ground, Trudi Coffey and Samuel Hill are two private investigators on the hunt



for Annabel. This novel is fast-paced and riveting. Mike answered a few of our questions about the beginning of his Coffey & Hill series.

This plot is pretty wild. Where did you get the inspiration?

Insomnia. When I can't sleep at night (which is more often than I like), I start imagining movie scenes in my head. If the scene sticks with me for a few weeks, I go ahead and write it down and then file it away in case more of the story presents itself later. For *Annabel Lee*, I couldn't sleep one night, so to entertain myself I invented the title character, and then asked myself, "How does her movie begin?" That's how the first chapter (and Dog) was created. After that, I just followed the story to see what would happen.

Are any pieces of this novel pulled from real life?

The character Dog is based on two of my favorite pets from my past. The first was a German Shepherd I owned when I was in my early 20s. He was the smartest, gentlest, fiercest, most loyal animal I have ever known. He used to herd my toddler


nephew away from the street when he thought the boy was getting too close to traffic danger. (There's a scene in the book where Dog herds Annabel to a small refuge from heat—that description is pretty much what my German Shepherd used to do with my nephew.) The second was a four-pound Chihuahua named Hercules. The scenes where Dog comforts Annabel in times of sorrow or fear are memories of me and my Chihuahua. The description of Dog's seizure is me remembering when Hercules got older and began to struggle with seizures before he passed away.

You've written so many novels; how was this one different in style or process?

Well, for starters I got to publish Annabel Lee under my own name! I spent several years publishing novels under a pen name because too many editors told me, "Mike Nappa is an inspirational author—he can't write suspense." So I used a pen

name to trick editors into reading my stories ... and then I got stuck using that name for a while. So I'm grateful that Revell was willing to publish this novel under my real name.

As for process, it usually takes me about a year to write a novel, but I stupidly spread the writing of this book over four years. I actually started it as part of a contract for another publishing house, but then that house decided they didn't want to publish suspense novels anymore, so they canceled my book. I was so discouraged by that, I quit writing fiction altogether. Trouble was, my wife had read the first few chapters of this novel, and she kept pestering me to finish it. I told her no. She asked again. I rolled my eyes and told her no. Then she pulled out the big guns: She and my pastor's wife started praying that I would finish it. They prayed for months until finally I broke down and gave in. I couldn't stop thinking about Annabel, Trudi and The Mute, so I had to write the book to get it out of my head.

This book begins your Coffey & Hill series. Can you tell us what's in store? How many books do you plan on releasing?

I've finished the second book in the Coffey & Hill series, which is titled *The Raven*. It's a story of a young street magician/petty thief who gets caught trying to blackmail a member of the Ukrainian mafia. And then, you know, things happen. *The Raven* releases in fall of 2016.


After that, we're planning a third book in the series tentatively titled *A Dream Within a Dream*. It's about a mildmannered art forger who may or may not also be a brutal murderer. That one was scheduled for release in 2017, but it looks like we're going to have to put that off until 2018 just because I need more time to finish it.

What makes your characters, Coffey and Hill, interesting and unique?



You won't want to waste any time getting started with the exciting fantasy series, Blue Time (Whitaker House), written by Andrew Maloney. With an original story set in a unique world full of intriguing characters, *Verse of Valor*, the second book in the series, is set to pull in even those readers who aren't avid fantasy fans.



How did this story come to be?

When I was 5 or 6, we lived out in the plains of Texas, and my curfew was when the sky turned super-blue as the sun set. The eastern horizon was twilit indigo fading to the deepest cobalt as the first few twinkling stars appeared; and the lower western horizon was aflame in oranges, reds, purples and pinks, with a swathe of lime-green separating the sunset from the sky.

I called it Blue Time, and it was always my favorite time of the day. I loved how it wasn't day anymore, but it wasn't quite night either—like a "timebetween-times." When I got a little older and discovered all the folktales about the golden hour—the "brillig" of Lewis Carroll's "Jabberwocky"—I was instantly captivated.

So when I was, I don't know, 14 maybe, I was sitting in the back seat of our car at Blue Time, reading a new Lawhead series, The Song of Albion; and I thought, I should write a story

about this time-between-times. So I scratched out the first lines then and there: a boy with asthma getting stuck in the Celtic Otherworld with a group of friends. I had 10 or 15 handwritten pages, and scribbled down ideas as often as I could. But it was just random adventures, nothing tied together.

Flash forward 20-odd years, and by this time, I had added a bunch of wild ideas about Greenmen, Awakened plants and animals, and the Master Song, which represented the seven prime virtues: love, wisdom, valor, might, devotion, kindheartedness and meekness.

From there, it was simply just telling the complete story.

In three sentences, what is this book about?


At its heart, *Verse of Valor* is an epic high-fantasy adventure story. Though the characters are young adults, I am one of those writers who believe

"young adult" does not appeal only to a specific age bracket. Ultimately, the story is about overcoming fear, facing your "giants," and realizing you are more courageous than you give yourself credit for.

Did the book change as you wrote it, and how is it different than what you originally planned?

The main tale has always remained the same: seven Verses need seven guardians. But as I set about creating the world and populating it with characters, the story has grown beyond just a group of kids playing weekend warriors out in the woods into something I'm extremely proud of: a living, breathing world that hides

just out of sight from ours. Now, as we get to the end of the series, when we start seeing those two worlds collide, that changed significantly from my original plans. I am confident it will be for the better!

Is it difficult to be accurate to a biblical perspective or biblical facts when writing fantasy fiction?


To the canonized scriptures, yes. I don't think God ever intended a race of Treebeings to be shepherds over a forest hidden in a "pocket of space" coinciding with natural earth. However, I have tried to keep with the themes and precepts of the Bible, if not the actual facts of the Bible. And who knows, most of these fantastical creatures are antediluvian, so if there were "giants in the land" 5,000 years ago, why couldn't some of them have been giant Treefolk? God is an exceptionally creative God.

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





At 17 years old Ashley Royer has amassed a following via social media that many debut authors are striving for. But can we really call her a debut author? She's been publishing content online for two years now via her thriving YouTube page. Is Ashley the future of publishing? She's definitely a talented, multi-faceted author who knows how to reach fans. Her book for teens, *Remember to Forget* (Blink), releases in April. Ashley answered our top questions about this project.



Is this your first full-length book?

This is my first full-length published book, but I did write another full-length book before this one, which is also on Wattpad.

When did you start building your platform online and what spurred this?

My online platform started growing when I began writing. One afternoon I went to the movies with my friend Rebecca, and she asked me if I had ever heard of Wattpad. I told her that I hadn't and she explained to me what Wattpad was. A few months later, I was thinking about writing, and I thought I would check it out. I started reading a book that someone had posted on Wattpad. After reading a few chapters, I thought that I would try writing something and see what would happen. I wrote the first chapter and after a day was so excited to see that I had some

readers. As I continued writing, I was gaining more and more readers and started developing a large following. I currently have over 70,000 followers on Wattpad.

Did you always know you wanted to be an author or did you just have an urge to be creative?

I have enjoyed writing since a very young age, but I never actually thought I would become a published author. As I began writing more, it started to become a little dream in the back of my mind. I never said to anyone that I wanted to become an author; in fact, I never even told anyone I was writing on Wattpad. But, I went on Wattpad because I had so many ideas and wanted to share them with others. I didn't want them to stay trapped in my head; I wanted them out there for everyone to read and relate to. The whole reason I started writing was

so my stories could change someone's perspective about themselves or others. I wanted my writing to make an impact on someone's life, but I never imagined it would be on thousands of lives.

Do you think you embody the future of publishing?

This is all so new to me that I don't really know. I hope that I have an opportunity to write more stories that will be published, but for now, I am going to enjoy the upcoming release of *Remember to Forget* and see what the future holds.

Let's talk about the novel. Where did the inspiration come from?

I'm not exactly sure if I had an inspiration. When I started writing Remember to Forget, I didn't really know what direction it was going to go in and had a lot of ideas but nothing was really planned. I spent a few months just planning the basic ideas, and I thought of the rest as time went on. A lot of times right before falling asleep, ideas would come to me. Sometimes I would write them down

so I wouldn't forget them by the time I woke up, but I pretty much would write one chapter a week, giving myself the days in between to come up with ideas for the next chapter.

Your protagonist is an Australian teen boy. Was it hard getting into his head to write this book?

It wasn't very difficult for me. Empathizing with others and understanding what someone is going through has always been a part of my personality. It's very simple for me to understand someone else's emotions and traits. I think because of that, it's simple for me to become my characters while I'm writing. I can easily put myself in their position and feel what they are feeling at that moment.

There's a bit of mystery in this book. And I'm guessing there's a bit of romance, too, right? How did you balance the two?

The main focus of the book isn't really romance or mystery. It's more about dealing with teenage struggles and watching Levi grow.

How long did you work on this novel and what was your writing process like?

Remember to Forget took me about nine months to write. Every week, I would write one chapter. I usually would write on Friday or Saturday nights, as that was the only free time I had to write. It would take me two to four hours to write a chapter and then I would would post it on Wattpad. Once it was posted, my followers would receive a notification from Wattpad that there was an update and I would watch the number of reads rise almost immediately. On Wattpad, readers are able to leave comments and I would read every single one, even if there were hundreds or thousands to read. The comments helped me see what my readers thought about certain events and helped me continue to write. They also helped me see what my


readers enjoyed or disliked and their excitement made me want to write even more.

What do you think teens want to read today?

There's such a broad selection of books to pick from now that it really depends on the person. Personally, I like realistic stories that I can actually see happening, so that's what I write. Right now, I think teens are reading less of vampires and werewolves and leaning more towards realistic stories. A lot of popular stories now deal with real teen problems, like anxiety and relationships, because that's what teens are going through. It helps them deal with and understand their own struggles.

Who and what are some of your favorite authors and books?

My favorite book is *Between Shades* of *Gray* by Ruta Sepetys. I was fortunate enough to meet her at a book conference in January. I also really like John Green; I think I've read all of his books. His style is somewhat similar to mine, and he writes realistic teen stories.



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
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
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
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
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
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

place. Any kind of book I want, Truck'll get for me. He says that's my education and I better make the most of it. I don't mind, though. I like books. I like reading. I like that Truck makes time for me to read each and every day of the week, no matter what. I like that at least twice a week—and sometimes more—Truck pulls a language book off the shelf and drills me on German verbs or Arabic phrases or Italian fairy tales or whatever. I like knowing there's something else out there to discover beyond just the acres of this farm, outside the closed-up community of Peachtree, Alabama. And I like it when Truck says I'm real good at learning and a "supernatural" at picking up different languages.

What I don't like is that dog.

It don't bark at me, not ever. But it growls. I can almost feel the rumbling in its throat before I hear it with my ears. Whenever the dog sees me, the growling starts. Sometimes Truck'll tell it to shut-up-mutt and swat it across the nose. But most times Uncle Truck don't even hear it. Most times it's just the dog and me, even when Truck or one of his farmhands is there.

The dog looks me dead in the eye. Never wags its tail. Never moves off its haunches. Just looks at me and growls, low, deep, and regular. It reminds me of some story out of a fairy tale, except the magic here is real, and bad. Like that dog was once an evil warlock vanquished by a handsome prince, and as his punishment, he was transformed forever into a dog that eats fingers and lives in a cage. Something like that.

I make my hands into fists whenever I have to be near that dog. I asked Truck once why he fed fingers to the dog. He looked at first like he was gonna laugh. Then he got a serious layer onto his face.


Funny how he's so peculiar about his name, but that dog ain't got no name at all.
